Vision Statement:

Our vision is "Success for All". Our mission at Orewa Primary School is committed to empowering ākonga to achieve personal excellence in a learning culture which values all. Refer Regulation 7 (a)

Summary of the information used to develop this plan:

This strategic plan was developed in consultation with our community, as directed by the Ministry of Education in the School Planning and Reporting Regulations 2023. The Board worked collectively on a series of questions to implement a community engagement survey, which was distributed to staff, parents and whānau. In addition, the Principal gathered feedback from parents in our community via telephone conversations with whānau, as well as feedback from the specific questions at the school gate over a series of days/weeks. The questions were formulated as follows:

- How well do you think we deliver on our vision of 'Success for all'?
- What do you see as Orewa Primary School's point of difference?
- What are the biggest challenges for our school in the next 6 24 months?
- What one thing could we do to improve your child's learning and experience at Orewa Primary School?
- Is our school giving effect to Te Tiriti o Waitangi?
- How could we do this better?

The results were collected using a google form and shared with our Board. A strategic planning day was organised to analyse the data and explore the key themes from the community engagement responses. Our original charter with our previous strategic goals was compared and we were able to identify the key themes of:

- Education/Mātauranga
- Wellbeing/Hauora
- Environment/Tūrangawaewae
- Engagement/Whanaungatanga

Following this, the Board extrapolated the significant and relevant information shared from our responses to the community engagement survey, as well as our current goals to formulate statements that presented as our goals beneath each key theme.
